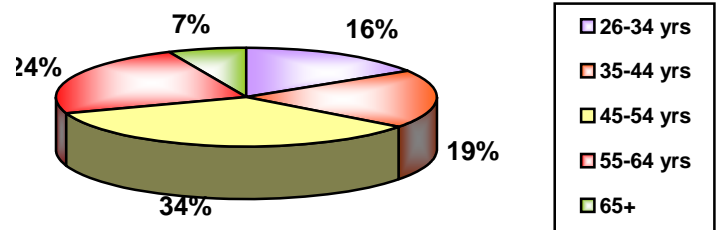


## Michigan (n = 225)<sup>1</sup>

- Sixty-seven percent of social work respondents from Michigan were over 44 years of age.

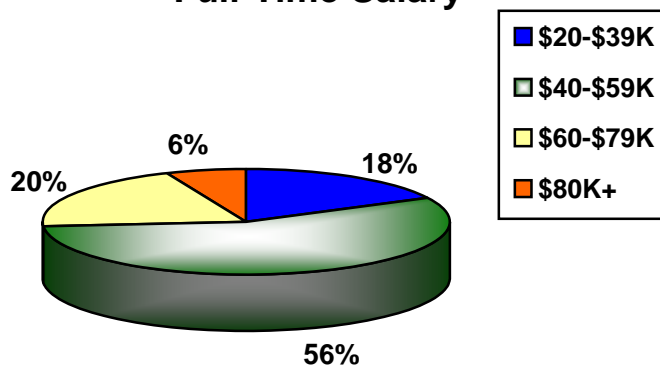
### Age

- The majority of Michigan respondents are white (88%). Eleven percent of respondents are black.



- The overwhelming majority of Michigan social workers hold a master's degree as their highest social work degree (97%).
- Respondents were asked to identify their primary practice setting for employment. Nearly one-fifth (17%) identified their practice setting as a behavioral health clinic/outpatient facility. Eleven percent are employed in each of the following settings: social service agencies; solo private practice; and schools. Sixteen percent identified "other" as their primary practice setting.

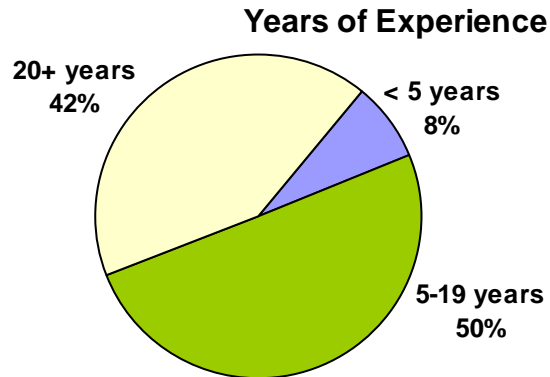
### Full-Time Salary



- The majority of Michigan respondents (56%) earn between \$40,000 and \$59,000 annually for full-time work. Nearly 20% earn less than \$40,000 per year.

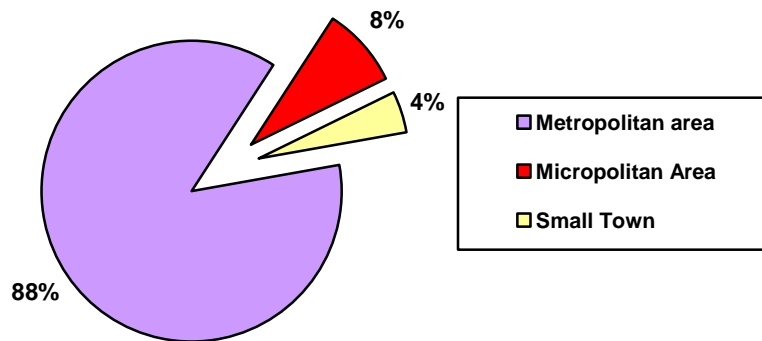
<sup>1</sup> This information is based on the results of the 2004 NASW National Survey of Licensed Social Workers. The total number of responses received was 4,487. Two hundred and twenty-five (225) of the respondents were from the state of Michigan.

- Just over 40 percent of Michigan respondents had 20 or more years of work experience. Less than ten percent had less than five years of experience.



- The majority of Michigan respondents worked in a private, non-profit setting (41%), followed by private, for-profit settings (29%). Thirty percent of respondents worked in a government setting at either the local (15%), state (14%) or federal level (1%).

**Location of Primary Work Setting**



- The overwhelming majority of Michigan respondents' primary work is located in a metropolitan area (88%).
- The majority identified Mental Health as their primary area of practice (47%), followed by Child Welfare/Families and School Social Work (11% each).
