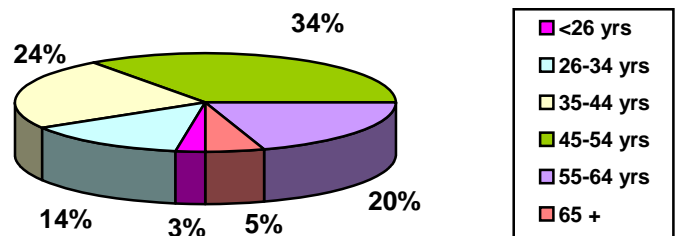


## New Jersey (n = 79)<sup>1</sup>

- Just over one-third of social work respondents in New Jersey (34%) are between 45 and 54 years old.

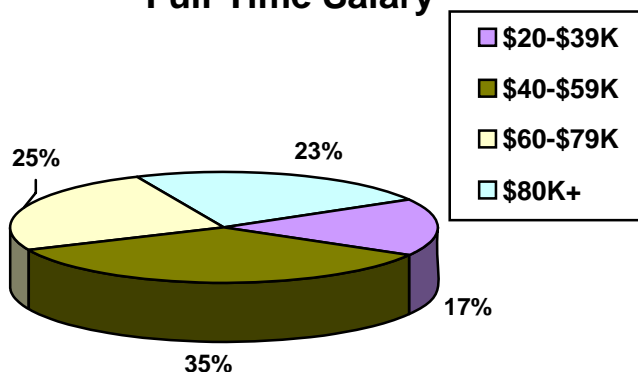
### Age

- The majority of New Jersey respondents are white (92%). Five percent are black and three percent are Hispanics.



- The majority of social work respondents in New Jersey hold a master's degree as their highest social work degree (97%). Three percent hold a doctorate.
- Respondents were asked to identify their primary practice setting for employment. The four most frequently cited categories were private solo practice (19%), behavioral health clinics/outpatient facilities (13%), schools (13%), and social service agencies (10%).

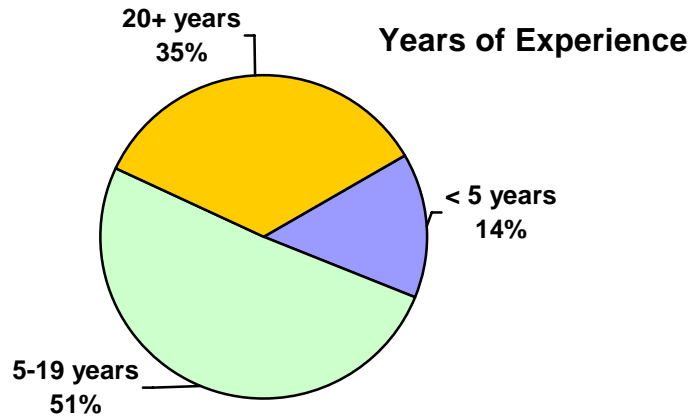
### Full-Time Salary



- The majority of New Jersey respondents (35%) earn between \$40,000 and \$59,000 annually for full-time social work. A quarter earn between \$60,000 and \$79,000 per year, while an additional 23% earn \$80,000 or more annually.

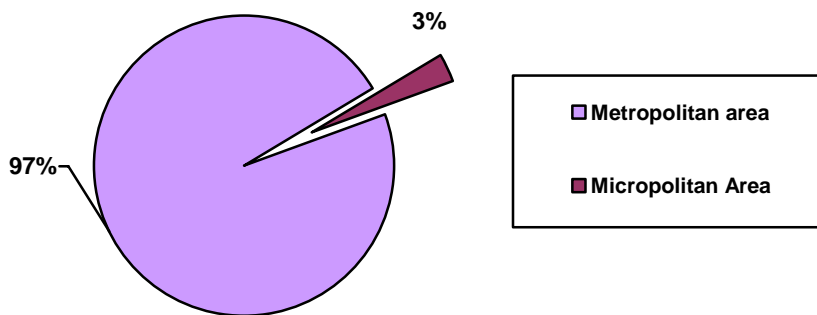

- The majority of New Jersey respondents have five to 19 years of experience, with another 35 percent having 20 or more years of experience.



- Nearly three quarters of New Jersey respondents (40%) work in the private sector, either in a for-profit (37%) or non-profit setting (36%).

### Location of Primary Work Setting



- The majority of social workers in New Jersey are employed in a metropolitan area (97%).
- Over a third (36%) identified Mental Health as their primary practice area, followed by School Social Work (12%), Aging (10%), Child Welfare/Family (9%), and Adolescents (8%).
