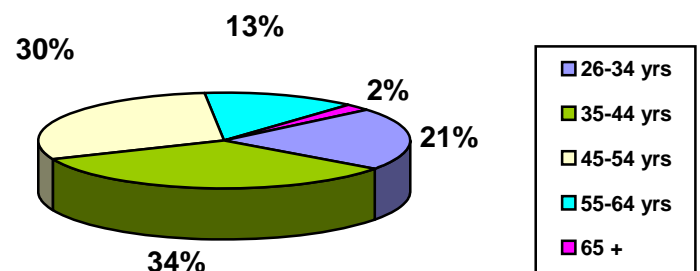


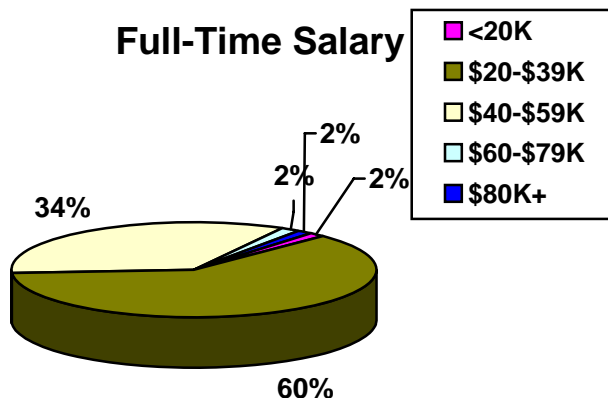
Ohio (n = 180)¹

- About one-third (34%) of Ohio social work respondents are between 35 and 44 years old. Thirty percent are between 45 and 54 years old, while close to one-fifth (21%) are between 26 and 34 years old.
- The majority of Ohio social work respondents are white (93%).

Age



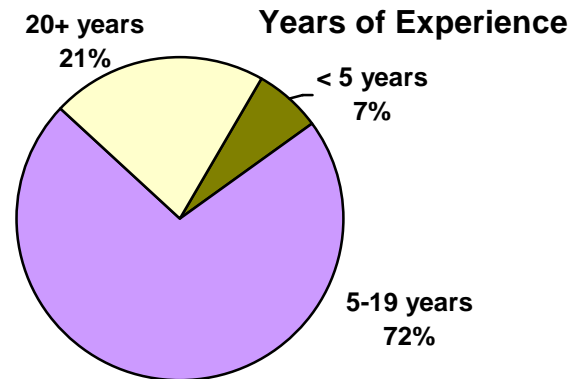
- In Ohio, 61 percent of social work respondents hold a bachelor's degree as their highest social work degree. Thirty-five percent hold a master's degree as their highest social work degree.
- Respondents were asked to identify their primary practice setting for employment. Nearly one-fifth (17%) are employed in a social service agency. Eleven percent of Ohio respondents are employed in a hospital/medical center, while 14 percent selected "other".



- The majority (60%) of social workers in Ohio earn between \$20,000 and \$39,000 annually for full-time work. Just over a third (34%) earn between \$40,000 and \$59,000 per year.

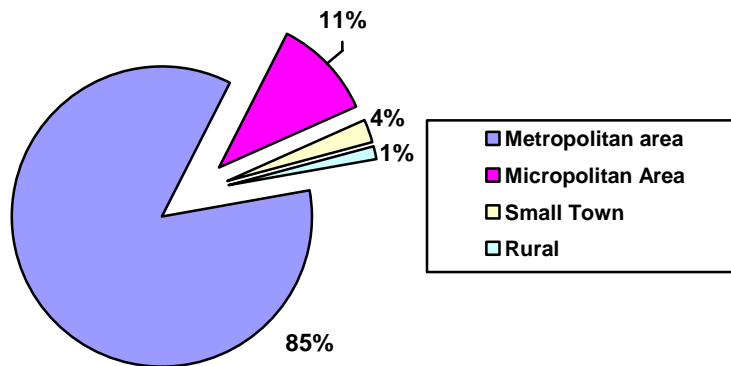
¹ This information is based on the results of the 2004 NASW National Survey of Licensed Social Workers. The total number of responses received was 4,487. One hundred and eighty (180) of the respondents were from the state of Ohio.

- Nearly three quarters of Ohio social workers have five to 19 years of experience, while about one-fifth (21%) have 20 or more years of experience.



- The majority of Ohio respondents (57%) are employed in private not-for-profit settings, followed by private for-profit settings (19%).

Location of Primary Work Setting



- The majority of social workers in Ohio are employed in a metropolitan area (85%).
- Nearly one-fifth (19%) identified Child Welfare/Family as their primary practice area, followed by Aging (16%), Health (12%) and Mental Health (11%).
