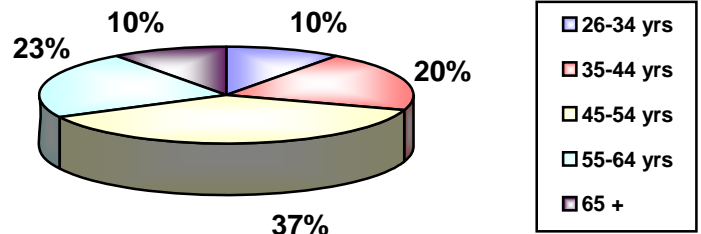
➤ Seventy percent of the social work respondents in Oregon are 45 years or older.

➤ The majority of social workers in Oregon are white (95%).

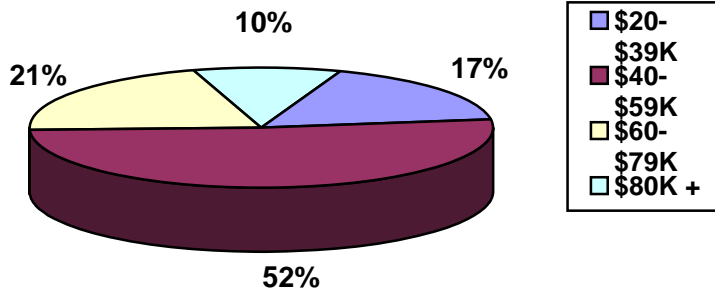
➤ The majority of social workers in Oregon hold a master's degree as their highest social work degree (95%).

➤ Respondents were asked to identify their primary practice setting for employment. The three most frequently cited categories were hospitals/medical centers (20%), private solo practice (15%) and behavioral health clinic/outpatient facilities (13%).

**Age**



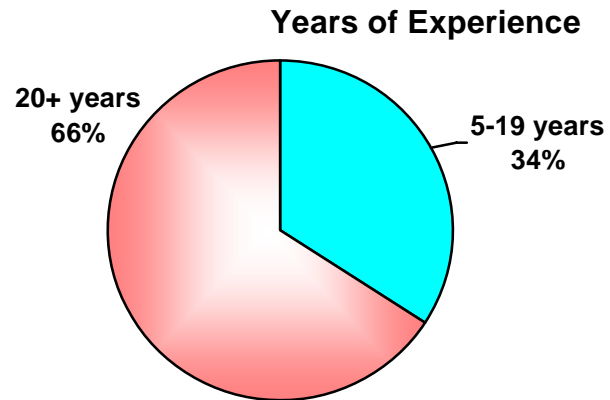
**Full-Time Salary**



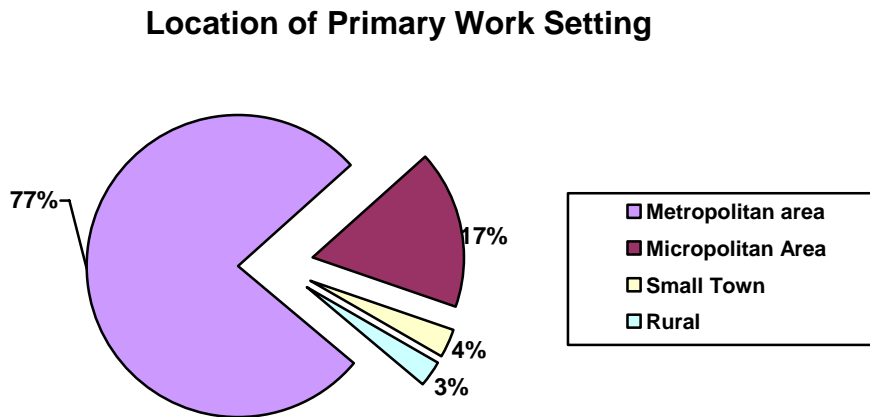
➤ The majority of Oregon's respondents (52%) earn between \$40,000 and \$59,000 annually for full-time social work.

- Two-thirds of social workers in Oregon have more than 20 years of experience.



- The majority of respondents are employed in a private, non-profit setting (44%).



- The majority of social workers in Oregon are employed in a metropolitan area (77%).
- The majority (40%) identified Mental Health as their primary practice area, followed by Health (23%), and Child Welfare/Family (10%).
